Lesson: African Mask: A Research Inspired Art Project

Grade Level: Advanced Art I

TEACHER AND STUDENT PROCEDURE

TIME	TEACHER PROCEDURE	STUDENT PROCEDURE

1 class period	For the first class period take the students to the library or computer lab so they may do research on African masks. (You may want to prep with your librarian so they may have time to obtain books or prepare guides for helping your students find accurate information online.)	Students should use their sketchbook to take notes and make thumbnail sketches of African masks they are inspired by. Ultimately they should pick one culture and mask to learn and write about to use as their own inspiration for their mask.
2 nd class period	Facilitate classroom work time.	Students will use the class time to take what they learned from their culture and chosen mask to create their own personal mask. They will work from their sketches to create the papier-mâché masks.
3 rd class period	Facilitate classroom work time	Students will continue to work on their inspired masks. Many masks may still be drying so they should use their time to start writing their artist statement on their research and how they applied their learning to their piece.
4 th class period	Facilitate classroom work time	Students should be painting and decorating their masks to be descriptive of themselves, their personal lives, their cultures and traditions etc. Homework: To finish their artist statement
5 th class period	Facilitate classroom critique and discussion of students masks	Students will present their finished mask by wearing their mask, then describing how their chosen culture and mask inspired them. They should also be able to explain how

OR		they showed their culture on their own mask.
5 th class period	Facilitate classroom work time	Students may need an extra day to work on their masks.
Possible 6 th class period	Facilitate classroom critique and discussion of students masks	Students will present their finished mask by wearing their mask, then describing how their chosen culture and mask inspired them. They should also be able to explain how they showed their culture on their own mask.
